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Nancy Diez Orsi told the Lew-Port students that she loved high school and if she could go back to the age of 16 she would. Although she left college after two years to raise a family with the help of her husband, Paul, she was able to return and earn her degree. She was a teacher and curriculum coordinator at Lew-Port. She retired from the Starpoint School System. After retirement besides running for public office and serving as a Town of Porter Trustee, she has served as interim principal in the Lew-Port District. She was named Town of Porter "Citizen of the Year" in 2010. She suggested that the students set goals and work on your goals one at a time. Nancy encouraged the students to get involve "everything you do does make a difference."

Tom Pryce told the students his class of 1972 was the best to graduate from Lew-Port. Undefeated football and soccer teams, and more National Merit Scholars. Tom was involved in high school serving on student council and attending school board meetings. After graduating from college, he



returned to run for the school board. Although not successful in his first attempt, on his second campaign he won and was the youngest school board member to serve the community for 12 years. had meaningful experiences during their time at LPHS. With each group we host a Town Hall Meeting that allows our students and the exchange students a chance to get to know each other,

their schools and their cultures. The Town Hall Meetings have received excellent press coverage and really make our exchange opportunities with these schools more impactful and meaningful for our entire school community.

As I write to you, I most recently returned back from China, where I spent eight days recruiting tuition paying students to attend our school in the 2014-15 school year. I traveled to many parts of China, including the cities of Tianjin, Chang chun, Shanghai and Nanning. The discussions I had with Chinese administrators and students went very well. They were very impressed with our school and school community. The recruitment opportunity was developed in partnership with D'Youville College. Lewiston-Porter and D'Youville have developed a partnership to recruit Chinese students to LPHS and then directly on to D'Youville College. The partnership and program were very well received. I anticipate 4-6 Chinese students joining us for the 2014-15 school year. I would also like to mention that a second partnership is in the development stages with SUNY at Oswego. SUNY at Oswego is also actively recruiting Chinese students for admission and study. SUNY Oswego is interested and impressed with the partnership established with D'Youville College. I anticipate a similar agreement with SUNY Oswego will be in place this winter.

Well, winter sports practices have now begun. The basketball season will start soon and that also brings another round of athletic Hall of Fame inductees early this December. Look for information about our L-P Athletic Hall of Fame in this issue of the newsletter. Please come out and support LP athletics this winter.

BOYS SOCCER – Coach Norm Forney

The Boys Soccer team finished the season with a 4-10 record. The team was in rebuilding mode this year, with only two seniors on the roster. Senior Bobby Stevens was honored as 2nd Team All NFL on Defense, as well as the All-Tournament Team for the ECIC/NFL Challenge Tournament at the beginning of the season. The team was hurt before the season, when their potential All League junior goaltender Ben Hastings tore his ACL and was out for the season. The team is looking forward to a good season next year with nearly the whole team returning.

GIRLS SOCCER – Coach Tom Penale

The Girls Soccer team was in rebuilding mode along with the boys team this year, finishing with a 5-13 record on the year. The very young team had only five seniors on the roster, and lost their best senior defender, Angela Gallo at the beginning of the season with an ACL tear, leaving a major void in their lineup. The team had numerous juniors and sophomores, and also had two 9th graders, Anna Kromer and Katelyn White, who were regular contributors on the field, and will be looked at as leaders in the future. These key injuries led to a difficult end of the season. However, the injuries served as a great opportunity for a talented young bunch of football players to get some valuable varsity playing time. The boys look to improve upon this year with a group of talented and speedy players coming up from the JV team.

GIRLS SWIMMING - Coach Josh Janese

The girls swimming team ended the season with a 7-7 record in the very competitive NFL this season. Highlights of the season include the team defeating Grand Island for the first time in 20 years, and Niagara Falls for the first time since the school merged in 2000. Seven of the Lancers received All League recognitions, including Leysa Broderick, Brittany Heffler, Kelsey Oliverio, Casey Radomski, Vinnie Costanzo, Grace Fiacco and Emma Waechter. In addition, those same girls qualified for Sectionals in eight different events. Junior Brittany Heffler led the way, participating in six events at Sectionals. With their top eight point scorers all returning next season, the girls are poised to be near the top of the league.

Letter from Dr. Jack Huebshmann, MD

Chief of Anesthesia, Mt. St. Mary's Hospital, Lewiston NY

As I sit here preparing for our next mission, this year to Armenia, I was reflecting back on some of the past experiences. I have had the privilege to be associated with The Hope for Tomorrow foundation for five years now as an Anesthesiologist. In the beginning, I was a little unsure of what to expect, but after the first trip I was sure this was a great thing to be doing and I wanted to be part of it.

I have had the chance to work with people high in the Andes Mountains of Peru where the air was a bit thin and the country a little bland but the people were wonderful and dressed quite colorfully. Then there were the mountains of Ecuador, a place where we physically stepped across the Equator which had similar people but quite a different culture. We went out to the tiny Islands of The Galapagos and although I didn't have much time for sightseeing we were able to help some children while working with a few of the local physicians. The next year I had the opportunity to work with Dr. Meilman on a young boy from Viet Nam who had a birth defect too large to take care of in country so the Foundation sponsored him to come to Buffalo and we performed the corrective surgery at my Hospital, Mt St Mary's in Lewiston. One of our administrators was recently in Viet Nam on business and stopped in to see him and said he is doing very well. The pictures she brought home attest to how well the surgery and recovery went. Last year we went to Haiti, in this case I saw a country devastated by earthquake, hurricane and years of poverty and dictatorial rule. Although this is expected it still amazes me each time I see it.

On all of these missions we spend quite some time traveling on questionable and sometimes precarious roads to the remote destinations where we work. Although this is harrowing at times it also gives me a sense for the people and culture of the people we will work on. The Hospitals we work in are reminiscent of what you might see on the TV show MASH with equipment circa the 1940's or so. My area of interest is the Anesthesia equipment. I typically find multiple pieces of equipment in various states of usability.

I find this part of the challenge fun as it lets me use my engineering background in conjunction with my medical training to get the job done. After a little playing around with the machines I usually get things working enough to start although I am often resigned to manually hand pumping my anesthesia machine, I suppose the way my predecessors did 100 years ago. This year, as mentioned, we are heading to Armenia. It will be my first trip to Europe. I am looking forward to the new opportunities, challenges and new people and culture. There is also a possibility on the way home to stop in Rome and meet the Pope. That would be quite an experience!

Ed Engel Honored for Distinguished School Board Service

Serving as a school board member is one of the most important responsibilities a citizen can undertake and Ed Engel is a man who readily gives his time on behalf of schoolchildren.

Engel served on Genesee-Wyoming BOCES Board of Education for seven years and has served on the Genesee Valley Educational Partnership Board of Education since 1996. He has served as Vice President of this Board since 2003. The Genesee Valley School Boards Association recently recognized Engel's life-long commitment to education and presented him with the Al Hawk Award for Distinguished School Board Service.

When asked why he volunteers, Engel is modest and humble but is quick to say that when people ask of his time that it's hard to say no. He truly believes in the value of giving back to his community.

"It's hard to refuse people when I see work that needs to be done," he explained.

Dr. Michael Glover, now retired District Superintendent of the Genesee Valley Educational Partnership, worked with Engel for over 10 years. Dr. Glover describes Engel as a true believer in public education.

"Ed has always been passionate about education. He was a teacher here before starting a very successful career in private business. Ed is a skilled and principled board member who always speaks his mind, votes his convictions and honors a respectful, thoughtful and reasoned tone at the board table. He is also a generous, kind, committed and caring person," Dr. Glover said.

Engel is unassuming when asked about his contributions but he is eager to share one of his favorite stories about being a career and technical education teacher.

"I had a young man who worked very hard in my auto technology class and earned a 90 percent average. The principal from his home school contacted me and asked if this grade was a mistake because he did not think this student could earn such a good grade. I was so proud of this student who went on to get promoted at a trucking firm. This opportunity helped him set his career path and shows how learning a trade can prepare a person for life. I just learned that his son is a student at the Batavia Career and Tech Center," Engel said.

Besides serving on the Genesee Valley Educational Partnership Board of Education, the list of Engel's accomplishments is long and varied. He is a member of the Rural Education Advisory Council, a member and past President of the Oakfield-Alabama Lions Club, a trustee for the Haxton Memorial Library Board of Trustees, Co-Chairperson for the Batavia Summer in the City Car Cruise, the Program Committee member of the Genesee County Business Education Alliance, a host parent for the American Field Service Exchange Student Program, and a member and past President of the Buffalo Public Schools Superintendent's Advisor Council for Occupational Education. In 2012, Engel was named an honorary member of the National Technical Honor Society, an award that notes his dedication to career and technical education. These are just a few examples of his commitment to his community and public education. Engel's volunteerism proves he is a steadfast supporter of education and he encourages others to give their time and talents.

"Choose something that you feel strongly about and make the time to support that cause. Think about the people in your life who helped you, and take some time to do the same for others. That can be your way of lending a hand. We all need to give back to our community," Engel said.
