LPAA Announces Mini-grant Winners

The Lewiston-Porter Alumni Association presented the 2010 Mini-grants at the Lew-Port Board of Education meeting on November 16, 2010.

Seven Lew-Port teachers won mini-grants this year to enhance learning in science literacy, chemistry, earth science, math and English language arts. These winning grants will support teaching needs this year at the Senior High School, Middle School and the Intermediate Education Center. Grants ranged from \$475 to \$500 each with a total of \$3,475 in grants being awarded.

At the Senior High, Kirsten Gresko, Michelle Hinchliffe and Colleen Glor received grants for the "Smart Response Interactive Systems" for use by ten teachers in the Science Department. The systems are used in connection with classroom smart board technology.



At the Middle School, Colleen Duffy, Sharon George, and Nina Calarco from the Math Department for "Smart Response Interactive Systems." The devices allow teachers to instantly assess their students knowledge and understanding of skills being taught.

At the Intermediate Education Center, Mary Ellen Aureli, School Librarian's winning grant is for audio books to support teaching English Language Arts.

The Lewiston-Porter Alumni Association also funded Mini-grant program in 2008 and 2009. Together with the 2010 awards 25 Lew-Port teachers have received grants totaling \$9,209. The Alumni Association plans to continue this program again next year to directly support classroom learning.

The recognition that the bus drivers receive at Lewiston-Porter Central School would not be possible without the cooperation and efforts that Ransomville Bus Lines, and the Schultz family have brought to Lewiston-Porter Schools. When the Lewiston-Porter Central School system was Director Richard Knapp wanted a reliable, safety conscience bus company to transport the students.

Les Schultz's Bus Company was suggested as a good bus company because of their safety record. Since 1934, when Mr. Schultz started with a couple of buses and at the time when Mr. Knapp approached Mr. Schultz, he has six buses servicing the Wilson Central School District. To get a contract with Lewiston-Porter, Mr. Schultz To be a bus driver, you have to be a purchased thirteen buses that were

problem was finding drivers for those buses. Mr. Schultz went door to door to the various farmers in the area figuring that if they could drive a farm tractor, they could drive a bus. This was how Mr. Schultz filled the requirements to meet the need of the contract for Lewiston-Porter.

In November 1954, Les's son, Paul, had just gotten out of the service and was going to work at Carborundum Company when Less offered Paul a job at the bus garage for \$60 a week. Paul had to make a decision.

In 1976, Paul's son, Kenny, joined the company and in 1978 Paul's other son, Steve, joined the company. Today at Ransomville Bus Lines and School Bus Service which also serves the Wilson Central School a fleet of 100 vehicles are ready to go daily with 85 employees.

Lewiston-Porter continues to make gains in educating and meeting the students needs in preparing them for their endeavors of the future. The bus drivers at Ransomville Bus Lines are part of the education team at Lewiston-Porter, for they transport the most precious cargo—the students!

Lew-Port's Alumni Soccer Game

The Odds, behind three goals from Justin Sims ('05) and a pair by Marc Niccola ('93), defeated the Evens 6-4 Saturday afternoon in the 21st annual Lewiston Porter Alumni soccer game played under ideal conditions before an appreciative crowd at Blakeslee Field.

Dena Novak ('91) opened the scoring for the Odds in the 9th minute when she fired a low shot from 22 yards out that skipped by Libby Broderick ('90) at the near post. The Evens surged back, with Jim Alessi ('86) just missing by a whisker at the left post. Both teams continued to have good chances, with Dena Novak being turned away by Broderick and Bob Minicucci ('84) hitting the post for the Evens.

Both goalkeepers came up big in the next few minutes, with Broderick besting Niccola in the 17th minute on a breakaway and Ken Tewsley ('89), at full extension, palming away a clever chip from Dave Vitch ('80) in the 23rd minute.

Minicucci brought the Evens level at 1-1 in the 32nd min-

ute with a pinpoint shot from 21 yards out that just eluded Tewsley's dive and caromed in off the left post. After a scrappy period when neither team could claim superiority, Niccola was brought down in the penalty area by Mark Davies ('80) in the dying seconds of the first half, and Niccola converted from the spot just before the halftime whistle to give the Odds a 2-1 advantage at the break.

It took less than a minute after the restart for the Evens to pull level. Joe Novak ('86) put a pinpoint cross into the box and Monica Aderhold Blake ('88) converted to knot the score at 2-2. Two minutes later the Odds regained the lead when Niccola scored his second goal of the game with a left-footed shot from a corner kick. Joe Novak leveled for the Evens two minutes later with a shot that sneaked inside the far post Seven minutes later Justin Sims ('05) broke the game open with two goals in two minutes, the first off a rebound after Broderick

had saved an initial shot from Niccola and the second from the penalty spot as Davies was called for a handball on the goal line to make it 5-3.

The Evens surged back, and only a fine diving save from Tewsley on Joe Novak kept the Evens off the score sheet. The Odds, rejuvenated by Tewsley's save, swarmed the Even goal. Broderick made three fine saves but Sims slotted the fourth attempt into the corner of the net to complete a natural hat trick, extending the Odd lead to 6-3. Six minutes from time a bad back pass to Tewsley was cut off by Minicucci, who scored his second goal of the game to make it 6-4.

Broderick was chosen as the game's outstanding female player in a losing cause, making 14 saves, several of them outstanding. Sims, scoring three goals, was chosen as the game's outstanding male player The Odd victory brings the series tally to 11-6-4 in favor of the Odds.
