





In the New Year Focus on Facts

What is fact fluency? Well, here is the "Cliff Notes" version. Math fact fluency is the ability to recall facts (answers) quickly. Depending on grade level this may include addition, subtraction, multiplication or division facts (general order of progression). For example, knowing that 5 + 3 = 8 or that 12 - 3 = 87 = 5 and being able to determine and state those answers quickly, demonstrates fluency. When demonstrating fluency a child may be flexible (use a variety of strategies) in how they reach the answer. Using the examples above, one child may solve 5 + 3 by counting on 3 times from 5, another may be visualizing a ten-frame with 5 in the top row and 3 in the bottom row and know that is the number 8. Many children, at the beginning stages may be representing those numbers with their fingers and counting each one. That suggests there is still more opportunity to build upon their number sense as counting by 1s does not result in quick recall of facts. In the case of subtraction, some students may start at 7 and count up to 12. Others may start at 12 and take 7 away. Still others may see that 7 is only 3 away from 10 (a known fact) and that 10 is only 2 away from 12 and know that 3 and 2 make 5. So, as you can see, for young children there are often many ways of thinking (strategy use) to determine the answer to a math fact. I have illustrated just a few.

Why is this important? Developing fluency with basic math facts helps children solve more difficult or complex problems and with more accuracy. In a manner of speaking, it frees up their brain power for more strategic thinking when solving math problems.

So, how do we help them build that ability to recall addition and subtraction facts quickly? It starts with building a concrete understanding of numbers and how quantities can be joined together to make larger numbers (addition concept) or quantities can be reduced by taking some quantity away (subtraction concept). Then children need to know strategies, like counting on, counting back, making doubles, making 5s or making 10s to name a few examples. These strategies are a part of math instruction, but you can remind your child to use strategies by asking them how they are going to figure out the answer. It is after that daily practice becomes important. Practice using games or flashcards, sing skipcounting songs, add and subtract objects around you. Have fun with it and make it a daily habit to practice with your child while home, driving or out and about! A few minutes of fun is all it takes!
