We have steam rolled a successful year at the PEC. Our students have learned how to lead and serve their community as they explore the 7 Habits of Happy Students. In our new S.T.E.A.M. lab, students were empowered to bring reality into the classroom across all subjects. They have worked proactively to become better readers, writers and problemsolvers.

Please continue to use the language of the *Seven Habits* this summer with your children to continue to build their confidence as young leaders. Nurture authentic learning. Your backyard is full of science experiments. Children are empowered to engage in the writing process when they become photo journalists or aspiring scientists. The most important plan is to make reading a part of your summer routine. Help children put first things first by reading with and to your children every day.

Join the Elementary **Scholastic Reading Challenge**. Our Scholastic Summer Reading Challenge is a free online reading program that invites students to log their reading minutes all summer.

The goal is for the students in our schools to **read the most minutes possible** in an effort to earn the title, "Best in State." As students log their reading minutes throughout the summer, they will earn digital rewards and weekly challenges. In addition, students who participate during the summer program will have an opportunity to celebrate their reading success in the fall.

The Scholastic Summer Reading Challenge is designed to help students turn the "summer slide" - the learning loss which can occur over the summer months—into a "summer leap" by discovering the joy and magic of reading for fun.

The fun begins on Saturday, June 1, 2019, and ends on Friday, September 6, 2019! Children can begin logging their minutes now by scanning the attached QR code and choosing their username/password. A QR reader app can be downloaded for free from the App Store or Google Play on any smartphone, tablet, or iPod. Children can also log in on any computer using the provided URL shortcut and bookmark the site for easy access all summer long.

Our local libraries will be supporting our efforts as well! Stop in at the **Lewiston Public Library, Ransomville Free Library,** or the **Youngstown Free Library** to log your minutes on their computers, for a forgotten or lost Scholastic username and password, and to enjoy all the summer programing they have to offer!

Students are challenged to read for 40 days for at least 15 minutes. They mark the days they have read on the provided calendar, send it in, and receive a personalized New York State Excellence in Reading Award. A personalized QR code was sent home with the Summer Reading Challenge details.
