
transitional plans that have been carefully prepared. Best wishes to all of our families!



What is Multiage?

A Multiage classroom is comprised of students of mixed ages grades 1st-3rd. Children spend the entire three years with a team of teachers that is truly a family unit. It promotes unity, diversity and success through developmentally appropriate educational practices. Multiage classrooms reflect the natural groupings found in our neighborhoods, communities and in the world, and provide opportunities for the exchange of ideas, modeling of behaviors, practice of responsibility and nurturance, and development of leadership and social skills. Several principles and practices are foundational to multiage classrooms:

- Teacher is the facilitator of learning (rather than the keeper of knowledge)
- Developmentally appropriate, child centered, continuous learning
- Integrated Curriculum
- Attention to the education of the whole child

Multiage focuses on abilities not deficiencies, with an emphasis on differentiated learning.

How Children Learn in a Multiage Classroom

Children learn best as active, not passive learners. Students learn and construct knowledge as a result of meaningful experiences. They learn actively through collaboration, play, social interaction, imitation, music, "hands-on" activities, drama, art, movement, reciprocal teaching and cooperative learning. These are some of the most "brain-compatible" educational practices that the Multiage classrooms feature.







Second Grade In - School Field Trip Submitted by Grade 2 Teachers

On Wednesday, March 30th, our grade 2 classes participated in Agricultural Literacy Week 2022. This week celebrates that agriculture is a unifying factor in communities across our state. Whether farming in unique urban spaces or rural landscapes, food brings people together. Mrs. Kelly Raby and Mrs. Robin Shipman read the story of Farmer Will Allen Growing Table and helped students understand that a love for growing food and stewardship for our soil and natural resources can be found everywhere.



The students participated in a question/answer session as well as a hands-on Exploration of Vermicomposting (live worms). This in school field trip was a terrific addition to what the students have been learning about in our Science unit on Plants and Animal Relationships.

The students learned that <u>Vernicomposting</u>- Is the process of using various species of worms, usually red wigglers, white worms, and other earthworms, to create a mixture of decomposing vegetable or food waste, bedding materials, vermicast, and liquid fertilizer (worm juice). Another term for vermicomposting is a worm farm. Using this process turns the waste into a nutrient-rich microorganism solution and solid compost capable of supplying necessary nutrients to help sustain plant growth without the use of harmful chemicals. The vermicomposting method is simple, effective, convenient, and cost-effective. Vermicompost takes trash and turns that trash into a precious resource to reuse.

The students were able to explore and interact in a worm investigation in safe and clean way. The presenters explained and reminded them that the worms are alive, and it is important to treat them gently and with respect. The students enjoyed exploring and interacting with the worms and learning about how composting helps us all.






