Ski club started, and they went down to Holiday Valley on November 30th, the 7th of December and looking forward to the 14th of December. Whether you are a pro skier or a beginner, you can get lessons on how to ski, or to increase your familiarity on the subject. You can take lessons at Holiday Valley or Kissing Bridge. If you're skiing or snowboarding, just have fun! Holiday Valley has 13 lifts, 60 slopes and trails, 3 base lodges, and a mountain coaster.

Ski club goes to Holiday Valley to ski, [and/or] snowboard. A beginner will probably start on the Schoolhaus slope. It is a beginner's hill to learn standing up, going down the hill under control, and stopping. After mastering Schoolhaus, most people look for the Mardi Gras lift and also like to go down Northwind. A green circle is easy, a blue square harder, and a black diamond hardest. The double black diamond is only for experts. At Holiday Valley, they have 1 double black hill called The Wall.

If skiers and boarders are looking for a harder hill, go down a blue. If you want to try a black, go ahead! A few Black Diamond favorites are Eagle, Yodeler and Moonshadow terrain park. A terrain park is where you can try out tricks. An easy terrain park is Fiddler's Elbow. Kissing Bridge has 39 slopes spread out about 700 acres of easy hills for beginners and harder hills for more familiar to skiing and snowboarding.

Social Studies teacher, Mr. Sweeney is the advisor for ski club. He says that the club has been going since 1980. This year there are about 16-19 kids that joined ski club. Mr. Sweeney has always been a skier. As he said, "I love Northwind. It is long and I am a speed freak. I love to go fast."






Q. What was your strategy?


Mrs.Marshall- My advisory raised money by selling treats at a concession stand and were also motivated by watching movies in advisory.

In third place is the Chiefs logo by Joey Mullen.





Chocolate Chip Cookie "Brownies"

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Take pan out and make sure it is neither too flat nor too wide.

Next, mix butter, eggs, white sugar and brown sugar.

Mix until well blended.

Add baking soda, salt and vanilla extract.

Mix well.

Finally put in the flour and then hand mix with a spoon or spatula the chocolate chips.

Put in oven for 15-18 min before checking.

Once out of oven let cool before adding toppings.

2 cups flour

2 cups chocolate chips

Christmas sprinkles and 10 melted marshmallows.

2 cups chocolate chips

1 tablespoon vanilla

2 cups chocolate

chips

½ cup white sugar

1 cup brown sugar (packed)

½ teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon salt

Take marshmallows and put in microwave for 1:30 or until melted. With oven mitts take marshmallow (in bowl) and pour onto the cookie.

Inside the orb, he couldn't see where everyone was hiding. He opened his eyes, hoping time would finish soon.


"Three, two, one." Skye applauded from her hiding position.


